After the untimely demise of this society in the 1900s, Poter moved no To The Munchester Albenseum Dimantic Society with their claim to be the oldest amateur dramatic society in the world and boasting Charles Dickens as a former emember (although Peter says he here saw him at a meheranal). They formed during the nineteenth century and had their own theatre in the centre of Manchester - The Althouseum institute - now a part of The Manchester City Art Gellers.

The intervening years saw Peter acting, directing and set painting with The Sale Nomads. A very successful organisation with their own rehearsal studio and scenery barn (formed around the same time as the BCP). Peter says they continue to thrive to this day and don't seem to have suffered unduly from his participation.

Moving to Oxfordshire in the early eighties with his wife Anne, Peter joined Benbury. Cross Players. Both are actively involved in all aspects of the society and have had many unforgetable opportunities to participate in a number of wonderful plays. "The Odd Couple, Pack of Lies, All My Sons, On Golden Pond and Breaking the Code to name but a few."

The first play Peter directed for BCP was Pinocchio in 1986. Some years later came Way Upstream, Noel Coward's Furned Oak for the 2007 Season Preview Evening and The Tinderbox in 2008. Peter's Iday lob' skills as a sign-writer are often called

upon by BCP. As resident Scenic Artist, this skill at bringing a flat piece of scenery alive is a joy to behold - although wee betide you if you steal his chalk or string!

Peter says Communicating Doors has presented many challenges but also many rewards. All those involved are enjoying the play and hope the finished product gives you as much furn to watch as it has given them to produce.





OTHER FAMOUS TIME MACHINES ...



H G Wells' The Time Machine, first published in 1895, and later adapted into at least two films and two television versions, is a novella generalty credited with popularising the concept of time travel using a vehicle allowing an operator to travel purposefully and selectively

The first visual adaptation of the book was a live teleplay broadcast from Alexandra Palace on 25 January 1949 by the BBC.



The TARDIS (Time And Relative Dimensions in Space) is the time machine in the BBC's science fiction programme Doctor



leaves it locked in the shape of a 1950s-style London police box.

Doctor Who is so much a part of British popular culture that the word "TARDIS" is used to describe anything appearing bigger on the inside than on the outside and the name TARDIS is, In fact, a registered trademark of the BBC. Back to the Future is a 1985 American film directed by Robert Zemeckls and produced by Steven Spielberg.

The film, starring Michael J Fox and Christopher Lloyd, tells the story of a teenager accidentally sent back to 1955 where he meets his parents in bloh school.



Dod's DeLorean DMC-12 has been modified into a time machine by means of a flux capacitor and a plutonium-fuelled nuclear reactor generating the required 1.21 gigawatts of power. The car travels to a programmed date and time upon reaching 88 miles per hour.
