John Hicks Chairman **Agatha Christie** was born Agatha Mary Clarissa Miller, in Torquay, on 15 September 1890 - the youngest of three children. Her happy childhood was interrupted at the age of 11 by the death of her father after which she became very close to her mother. Agatha never received any formal schooling, but she did not lack an education. In 1917 she qualified as a dispenser and acquired a sound knowledge of poisons - a job that was to influence her later writing as many of the murders in her books are committed by poisoners.

On Christmas Eve 1914, she married Archibald Christie, an aviator in the Royal Flying Corps. They had a daughter, Rosalind.

Mrs Christie's first novel, *The Mysterious Affair at Styles*, was published in 1920 and earned the princely sum of £25. In late 1926 Archie revealed he was having an affair and wanted a divorce. This, together with the recent death of her mother, was too much for Agatha to bear. On the evening of 3 December she disappeared from her home and was missing for 11 days. After a large scale Police hunt she was discovered by a reporter as a guest at the Swan Hydro Hotel in Harrogate where she was registered as Mrs Teresa Neele from Cape Town. Public reaction to her disappearance was largely negative with many believing it to be a publicity stunt.

In 1930 she married again - to archaeologist Max Mallowan after joining him on an archaeological dig in Baghdad. They bought The Greenway Estate in Devon as a summer residence in 1938 for £6000. This property is now in the care of the National Trust. She wrote 41 *Poirot* stories and 14 *Miss Marple* as well as writing under the pen name Mary Westmacott. Whilst living in Cholsey, she became President of the Wallingford Drama Society.

In 1971, she became Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire. Around this time, her health began to fail, although she continued to write, and in 1975, sensing her increasing mental and physical frailty, she signed over the rights of her most successful

play, *The Mousetrap*, to her grandson .

She died on 12 January 1976, aged 85, at her Winterbrook House near Wallingford. She is buried in the nearby churchyard of St Mary's, Cholsey.

TERRY GALLAGER's first theatrical flirtation was in his early 20s whilst stationed at British Army HQ in Moenchengladbach, Germany, in a purpose built theatre, as assistant to the assistant lighting technician. The huge responsibility for two sliders bringing up the foot lights was to have a lasting impact and it was 30 years before he dared venture theatre-ward again.



In the late 1980s, Terry joined Aynho Community Theatre, learning a great deal about the craft of Directing - Terry's discipline of choice - being the facilitator in a well-oiled team where everyone's ideas have value. Terry particularly enjoys the process of taking the written word of the script and converting it to well-rounded, credible characters, caught up in the story of the playwright's choosing where imagination is key — whether it be that of actor, director or audience. "For me, for the play to work, there has to be tension; a protagonist and an antagonist; and the opportunity to explore the emotions created by the situation in which the characters find themselves"

Terry steers clear of working with large groups of actors – as for pantomime or in productions like *Brassed Off* or *Wyrd Sisters* – leaving that to the more 'adventurous' of BCP's stable of directors. His Directing credits to date for BCP are:

Acting credits include The Duke in *Wyrd Sisters*, Uncle Bernard in *Season's Greetings* and Laurie Lee in *Cider with Rosie*. Terry organises BCP's involvement in Banbury's Canal Day each year as well as arranging our Castle Quay promotional jaunts and being our point of contact with the Oxford Drama Network.

And when not doing any of that (!), Terry spends his time pursuing the other great love of his life – cross country walks complete with map and compass.
